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## INPUT NEEDED ON PLANS FOR INDUSTRIAL LAND ON SALT SPRING ISLAND

VICTORIA — The Salt Spring Island Local Trust Committee (SSILTC) invites residents to learn about, and give feedback about how to meet the need for industrial land on the island for the next 25 years.

Community meetings will give residents a chance to learn about the recommendations in the final report of the Industrial Advisory Planning Commission's (IAPC), a group of volunteers who worked with consultants to estimate the current and future demand for industrial land on the island.

"Having a plan today will enhance future economic growth and security on Salt Spring Island and we are grateful to the IAPC for giving us valuable information as the foundation for the long-term plan," said Peter Grove, Trustee of the Salt Spring Island Local Trust Committee. "As we implement the recommendations of the IAPC, we want to present the proposed changes to the community and hear from them about their hopes and concerns."

The key recommendation of the IAPC is to update the industrial zoning framework in the Salt Spring Island Land Use Bylaw No. 355 to make it simple, consistent, and adequate for the needs of the community. The current system of industrial zoning has not been updated since 2001.

The SSILTC has contracted Island Planning Services to help update the framework. The community's input will help refine the proposed changes and the information will help the SSILTC in its decision-making.

Three community meetings will be held on Wednesday, February 16, 2016:

- 2 - 4 p.m. at Shared Space, Unit #1-315 Upper Ganges Road (Merchant Mews)
- 5:30 - 7:30 p.m. at the Gulf Islands Secondary School, Multipurpose Room, 232 Rainbow Road
